#### Welcome to the first edition of our newsletter for 2023.

Last year was again an extremely busy year

at Galway Hospice with demand




for our services continuing to grow. We cared for 971 patients at home in Galway, our Inpatient unit in Galway looked after 322 patients and the Inpatient unit in Mayo cared for 259 patients. We also recommenced Daycare services in both Galway

and Mayo during quarter one, 63 patients attended the service in Galway and 45 patients attended the service in Mayo. It has been fantastic to be able to welcome these patients to the hospices each week and it has brought great energy and life to both buildings. If you would like some more information on what was achieved during 2022, please have a look at our Operational Quality and Risk Report for 2022 which is published on our website.

We were delighted when the Minister of Health announced that Galway Hospice would be redesignated as a Section 38 agency last October, this was something we had been lobbying for in recent years. The process will take at least a year to complete and we hope that it will result

in an increase in our core funding once completed. This should allow us to free up some fundraised income to fund the cost of building a new hospice in Galway. We are continuing to work with the HSE and our property advisors to identify a site and are hopeful of progressing the project during 2023.

Our care would simply not be possible without the continued support of you; our local people and supporters. You make a difference in so many ways, there are great examples of this in this newsletter. It has been fantastic to see the Galway community rally around as we returned to in-person events again last year.

Thank you to everyone in Galway city and county for your continued support, enabling us to give the best care that we can give to those who need our services. All that we do at Galway Hospice could not be achieved without the support of our staff, volunteers and the wider Galway community. Thanks to you, patients living with a life limiting illness and families who need our services have been cared for and supported. You really have made a difference.

# carmel wilmot's story

Carmel Wilmot, who lives in Monivea in County Galway, began to feel unwell after her mother's month's mind in 2019 and couldn't pinpoint what was wrong with her, "My back was hurting me and I had MRIs and stuff on my back. Long story short, by the August/September that year I was feeling really unwell. I went to a local GP and I kind of knew something was not right". Carmel's GP went onto examine her and straight away recognized the issue. "I knew by the woman's face, she didn't have to say anything. She was horrified that I'd been in hospital and they'd let me out". Carmel's GP sent her directly into the Maternity Unit in the University Hospital, Galway. From there, Carmel was diagnosed with cervical cancer.

Carmel began to get her head around her diagnosis but later felt an overwhelming sense of shock when she was told she was going to be put in touch with a Palliative Care Team, "It horrified me because I thought, 'Oh my God am I going to die here and they haven't told me." When Carmel

came out of the hospital, she was put in touch with Galway Hospice. The hospice palliative care team were given the responsibility of controlling Carmel's pain and managing her pain relief. She also began sessions of Art Therapy with Art Therapist, Kathy Hyland. Carmel found this hugely beneficial as she lives alone, "It was my lifeline to be able to come in here". Carmel tells of days when she'd come into the hospice in great pain and would end up spending an Art Therapy session crying with Kathy, "Kathy just has that lovely gentle nature about her, as the weeks went on I built up that bond with her and I felt very comfortable".

Carmel advises anyone who receives a life changing diagnosis to remember that the hospice is there for you, "You know you can come in and you know they're there for you. A cancer journey is not a journey you wish on anybody. It's not a road I ever thought I'd have to walk. I suppose what helps is all the people you meet along the way". Carmel says the hospice really helped take some of her fear away and for anyone starting on a journey to avail of the help that is out there, "Reach out to the hospice and get to know what they can do for you".

# Experiencing all sides of Hospice Care - Marie Togher

Marie Togher, from Tuam was diagnosed with anal cancer in 2019. After a year of radiotherapy and chemotherapy, she was given the all clear. She made the most of this great news and enjoyed a year of travelling and spending quality time with her family. Unfortunately, Marie attended a checkup after one year and was informed about the return of her cancer, which now resides in her lung and upper body.

After a discussion with her consultant, Marie made the decision to carry on living with the disease and opt out of treatment this time round, "I decided to go with quality over quantity". This resulted in Marie being put in touch with a Galway Hospice Community Palliative Care Nurse, who visited her at her home in Tuam, "I thought the

world of the nurse. She was good to me on the good days and she was there for me on the bad days".

Marie has experienced all sides of hospice care, as she later spent time in the Inpatient Unit and now is a regular participant in Day Care. During her time in the Inpatient Unit, Marie made a life-long friend called Peggy. Peggy's bed was directly across from Marie and they became firm friends very quickly. The ladies now ring each other every day and don't go to sleep at night without wishing each other a good sleep and saying I love you.

Speaking about Day Care, Marie couldn't praise the service highly enough and says she spends most of her time laughing with volunteers, "I enjoy the chats here. We don't talk about sickness, we escape it."

The group has a steady attendance of people who have begun to build


